Maths

Geometry:

I can name some 2D and 3D shapes.

I can talk about position, direction and movement.

I can talk about and show whole turns, half turns, quarter turns and three quarter turns.

Number and place value:

I can count to and across 100 forwards and backwards; I can read and write numbers to 100

I can count in twos to at least 24

I can count in fives to at least 60

Project : Where we Live (Art, DT, Geography and History)

In these areas of the curriculum we will use our project based learning to cover the following objectives taken from the National Curriculum.

History

Pupils should be taught about significant historical events, people and places within their own locality
Changes within living memory. Where appropriate, these should be used to reveal aspects of change in national life.

Geography

Understand geographical similarities and differences through studying the human and physical geography of a small area of the UK, and of a small area in a contrasting non-European country

Key human features, including: city, town, village, factory, farm, house, office, port, harbour, shop

Use simple field work and observational skills to study the geography of their school and its grounds and the key human and physical features of its surrounding environment

DT and Art

Design purposeful appealing products for themselves and other users based on design criteria

Generate, develop, model and communicate their ideas through talking, drawing, templates, mock ups and where appropriate information and communication technology

select from and use a range of tools and equipment to perform practical tasks [for example, cutting, shaping, joining and finishing]

select from and use a wide range of materials and components, including construction materials, textiles and ingredients, according to their characteristics

to use a range of materials creatively to design and make products

to use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination

to develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space
